(please read carefully)

- 1. Exhibits in Writing, Social Science, School Crafts and Posters will be judged Thursday at 6:00 PM. Attach entry tag top right hand corner. Entries in these categories must be at the Fairgrounds before 5:30 PM on Thursday. Building opens Thursday at 12:00 noon.
- 2. Exhibits in Flowers, Vegetables, Home Hobby and Baking will be judged Friday at 10:00 AM. Entries in these categories may be brought to the Fairgrounds, either on Thursday from noon to 5:30 PM or on Friday morning between 8 AM & 9:30 AM. Entries must be at the fair before 9:30 AM
- 3. Entries must be picked up from 4:30 to 5PM on Monday. TEACHERS, PLEASE DO NOT ARRIVE BEFORE 5:15 PM
- 4. All entries must be new work, and shown one year only. Directors will disqualify any work recognized as a previous entry.
- 5. Only one entry per section number in each class will be allowed.
- 6. Please observe all size specifications.
- 7. School Fair Directors cannot be responsible for loss or damage to any entries.
- 8. Prize money will be delivered to area schools, as soon as possible after the fair.
- 9. Prize winning entries will be displayed. Other entries will be displayed as space allows.
- 10. Judges have the right to disqualify any entry they feel is beyond the age capacity of the student.
- 11. All judges are hired by the Norwood Agricultural Society as specialists in their field.
- 12. Students must attend regular school classes. If "Home Schooling" please supply name of affiliation group, plus name, address and phone number of student. Students must enter at their own grade level, not above please.
- 13. Sections which exceed 50 entries will have an additional set of prizes awarded accordingly.

RECIPES

Chocolate Marshmallow Squares:

- 1 cup semi sweet chocolate chips (250mL)
- 2 tbsp butter or margarine (30mL)
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 cup icing sugar (250mL)
- 2 ½ cups small coloured marshmallows

Melt chocolate chips and butter in microwave.

Add icing sugar and egg, mixing until smooth and cooled.

Add marshmallows, stirring gently to coat. Press into buttered cake pan.

For thicker squares, push mixture to one side of pan or double recipe.

Chill well.

To cut into squares, first dip a sharp knife into hot water.

Ginger Sparkles:

3/4 cup shortening (175mL)

1 cup white sugar (250ml)

1 egg

1/4 cup molasses (50mL)

2 cups flour (500mL)

2 tsp. ginger (10mL)

2 tsp. baking soda (10mL)

1 tsp. cinnamon (5mL)

½ tsp. salt (2mL)

In larger bowl, cream shortening and sugar until fluffy.

Mix in egg and molasses.

In smaller bowl, mix together the next 5 ingredients, then add to creamed mixture.

Form into balls, then roll in white sugar. Place on a lightly greased cookie sheet and flatten with a fork.

Bake at 350F (180C) 10 to 12 minutes.

Chocolate Haystacks:

1 cup white sugar

1/4 cup milk

1/4 cup butter

1 tsp. vanilla extract

2 tbsp. cocoa powder, heaping

1 1/2 cups rolled oats

1/2 cup shredded coconut, sweetened/ unsweetened

Add sugar, milk and butter to a medium pot and bring to a rolling boil over medium heat.

Add cocoa and boil from 1.5-2 minutes.

Remove from heat & stir in vanilla.

Add in the oats and coconut and stir until combined.

Spoon onto a parchment paper lined baking sheet, cool at room temperature until firm.

RECIPES CONTINUED

Pumpkin Muffins:

1 egg

1/4 cup sugar (50mL)

1/3 cup oil (75 mL)

1 cup canned pumpkin (250mL)

1/2 cup milk (125mL)

1 1/2 cups flour (375mL)

1 tsp. baking soda (5mL)

1 tsp. baking powder (5mL)

1/2 tsp. salt (2mL)

1/2 cup raisins

1 tsp. (heaping) cinnamon (5mL heaping)

In a small bowl beat egg until frothy.

Mix in sugar, oil, pumpkin, milk.

Combine in large bowl flour, baking powder,

baking soda, salt and raisins.

Pour wet into dry ingredients and stir only

to moisten.

Batter will be lumpy.

Put into greased muffin tin. (makes 9)

Bake at 400 F (200 C) 15 to 20 minutes.
